- 1. Call to order by Chairperson Morrison at 6:03 p.m
- 2. Roll call: Espinosa, Fuson, Merrit, Pfeil, Poock. Also in attendance Chad Renly, Jason Sergeant,
- 3. Motion to approve the agenda made by Espinosa and seconded by Fuson, passed on a voice vote.
- 4. Motion to waive the reading of the October 19th, 2021 minutes and approve them as printed made by Poock and seconded by Espinosa passed on a voice vote
- 5. Citizen appearances other than agenda items listed
 - A. Mark Mellecker B.A.S.E. Update, BASE is willing to purchase a metal lock box with a wrap to place at Hole 1 at the disc golf course. The box opens by use of a QR code and will contain discs and score cards for public use. BASE is requesting that the city install the box, which comes with pre-drilled holes in the bottom. BASE is willing to pay for any additional hardware required for installation. BASE will maintain the discs and the score cards and check the box on a regular basis and any additional upkeep. Motion to approve the installation of the disc golf box made by Poock and seconded by Espinosa, passed on voice vote.
 - B. Boy Scouts Winter Event Update by Keith Henning. Last year on the February 13 the Boy Scouts hosted their winter event and had 142 people attend despite the cold weather. They are looking to host this year's event on February 12, 2022 from 8 to 2. Poock made a motion to approve the event, seconded by Fuson, approved on a voice vote.

 - A. Lake Leota Dam Repair (place holder): The State Historical Society has approved the plan for replacing the stone wall with a concrete wall. Once the

DNR approval is complete, the project will be put out to bid, probably in February.

- B. 2021 creek walls & 2nd duck house (place holder): Foundation for the duck house has been poured, finishing the stonework.
- C. Wind Prairie Park Path: Path is in and they are completing the leveling of the ground up to the edge of the path. Will be seeded in the spring.

9. Old business

A. Park & pool design update (place holder): Comment period for the 3 MSA concepts for the West Side Park ended. Received about 135 comments that MSA will review. Jason Sergeant received 10 e-mails outside of the formal comment form and those were forwarded to MSA along with the comments. Baker Street is working on the feasibility study and the final meeting is to be held on November 17, 2021. There will be additional feedback from the interviews with Baker Street.

MSA reached out to all sports programs and other stakeholders and the results were posted to the website.

Discussion surrounding comments made to PRB members from various stakeholders has illustrated some of the issues and struggles to design the new park but the comment data will help identify trends. Sergeant pointed out there will likely be many iterations of the design but not all groups will be pleased in the end.

- B. Adopt-A-Park Program (place holder):
 - i. Received an Adopt-a-Park Renewal Application from the State Bank of Cross Plains has offered to adopt Franklin Park. Poock asked that applications be shared with the PRB and possibly a spreadsheet that shows the parks and flower beds and who has adopted them. Still problems getting sign designs from local sign shops. A suggestion was made to check with the High School Tech Shop. No motion was made.

Project Process Report | November 17, 2021

What's New?

The MSA team, along with Water Technology, Incorporated (WTI) and Rettler Corporation, has started to develop preliminary concept layouts for the park, aquatic and athletic facilities. The concepts use input from stakeholder programming meetings and City staff to establish layouts based on the desired programming and assumed project budget. Road design, preliminary grading, stormwater management are being considered to accommodate the proposed improvements efficiently.

MSA and WTI met with City staff to review magnitude schematics to identify the scale of aquatic facility that can fit the City's identified budget. The team used this basis to develop a footprint that fit the site while also considering vehicular and pedestrian flow around the park and connections to the athletic facilities to the east.

Alternate layouts such as the aquatic center to the east near the existing parking lot were explored. Impacts of stormwater and conflicts with existing residential properties identified the western placement to be preferred.

Two public engugement sessions took place to display the very intial conceptual design and gain public input early in the planning design process.

A Public Comment period was held through November 14th. Initial feedback has been excellent and has identified a number of proposed ideas and changes to the initial concepts to better fit the needs of project stakeholders. A summary of the feedback will be provided with the next update.

Summary of Public Comment | November 17, 2021

Summary of Public Comment

Preliminary Concepts

MSA Presented the Preliminary Concepts at a Public Open House on October 28, 2021 and Attended the Jack-O-Lantern Jamboree held on November 6, 2021 at J.C. McKenna Middle School.

Public comments were collected on the City's website as well as via hard copy during the events as well as City Hall. Comments were accepted through November 14, 2021. A total of 182 comments were received – via the Survey Form or direct emails.

Themes:

- Preferred Concepts:
 - West Side Park Option "A" –
 - o Aquatic Center Option "3"
 - Leonard-Leota Splash Pad no clear choice
- Comments (159)
 - o 81 related to Soccer
 - o 21 Ballfields
 - o 21 Aquatics
- Review of comments appears to show preference for West Side Park Option "A" to be related to arrangement of athletic fields and ballfields and location of aquatic center.
- There was no clear preference for the alignment of the road through from 7th to Wyler or Windmill Ridge.
- Loss of 2-3 Soccer Fields is determental to soccer program in Evansville.
- Design of roads and parking got mostly positive reviews when mentioned in comments, some concerns expressed by neighbors of the park regarding traffic and lighting, during events.
- Future project communication should discuss accessibility, general character of park(s), landscaping.
- Trails and Open Space should be key to West Side Park Plan.
- Concerns expressed about budget and maintenance of an aquatic center and splash pad.

Summary of Comments for West Side Park "A":

- Prefer soccer fields behind houses.
- No overlap of Athletic Fields and ballfields (at least 10 mentions).
- Grouping of Ballfield backstops.
- Number of ballfields (although a null comment since all three concepts had three).
- Connection through to Wyler/Windmill.
- (11 of 81 with Comments for Soccer Liked Concept A).

Summary of Comments for Aquatic Center Option "3":

- Inclusion of landscaping and green-space to break up space.
- Small lazy river, lots of green space for youth to play.
- The zero entrance and the slides are easily visible simultaneously for parents with kids using each section.
- Some concern about traffic from aquatic center.

Summary of Public Comment | November 17, 2021

Summary of Comments for Leonard-Leota ParkSplash Pad:

- Splash pad designs seem similar.
- Like the extra green space on the Splash pad and playground area.
- Nice sized splash pad (I loved Palmer Park when the kids were little and this is what I envision)
- Option C The splash pad is closer to the rest of the park & integrates it into the park better. 2.) The tiered
 design of the splash pad in C takes advantage of the sloped site, could look more "natural" to blend with the
 beauty of the rest of the park.
- I think that the current plan could be scaled back tremendously and save quite a bit of money.








Project Process Report | December 13, 2021

What's New?

A Public Comment period was held through November 14th. Responses identified a number of proposed ideas and changes to the initial concepts to fit the needs of project stakeholders better. A total of 182 comments were received – via the Survey Form or direct emails. Primary takeaways from community feedback:

- West Side Park Concepts did not include the proper mix of athletic fields the field layout shown is not sustainable for soccer in Evansville.
- Aquatic Center Option 3 was preferred, emphasizing open water play and the lap pool.
- <u>Leonard-Leota Park</u> Option C was preferred. The splash pad is closer to the rest of the park (elevation) & integrates it into the park better. The tiered design of the splash pad in C takes advantage of the sloped site, could look more "natural" to blend with the beauty of the rest of the park.
- Future project communication should discuss accessibility, the general character of the park(s), landscaping.

The Design Team (MSA, WTI, and Rettler) developed updated concepts to address the feedback received from the community as well as the City's project team.

<u>West Side Park</u> - The revised concept shows two full-sized soccer fields, a 300-ft ballfield and a 200-ft softball field. An additional backstop is provided for practice and recreation play. A second 200-ft field was omitted from the concept to maintain additional unprogrammed open space and equity in the dispersion of resources between baseball/softball and soccer. A different concept was developed that shows an updated view of the referendum plan, note due to spatial constraints, sizes of the fields were reduced in this concept.

<u>Aquatic Center</u> – Option 3 was updated to show alternate arrangements of the diving well and lap pool to develop flexibility in lap swim and pool availability. Overall site modifications included a revision to the landscape areas and site amenities.

Work is ongoing for design at Leonard-Leota Park. An updated plan will be provided in the January update. The next stages of design will begin to refine the current proposed construction estimates and identify possible phasing of the overall master plan designs.









WEST SIDE PARK - REFERENDUM FIELD CONFIGURATION EVANSVILLE, WI - December 13th, 2021









My name is Mary Libby. I'm advocating for an indoor swimming pool at the school. I have been swimming three miles per week for about 50 years. I swim due to a hip fracture when I was 15.

I've been researching an indoor pool for Evansville since the inception of Creekside Place. Mary Peckham's endowment spoke of having an indoor pool along with the Community & Senior Center.

I swim at the Oregon Community/School Pool. It is a modest, basic, very versatile pool which is maintained beautifully. You might say to me, "Why don't you drive 15 minutes up the road and keep using the Oregon Pool? Do we want to tell Evansville citizens to go out of town when we're proposing an \$11 million budget for the West Side/Leota Park project?? There are 28 "members" at the Oregon Pool who are from Evansville. The number of walk-ins who are not members is much larger. They are working on a zip code sort to give me that number. When folks are in Oregon, they gas up their car, have lunch, go to Walgreens, Bill's Grocery and Dorn's Hardware which are located within walking distance of each other. There are also two banks and the Dean Clinic in that same area.

I support the splash pad at Leota Park. I support the athletic fields at the West Side Park.

The "lazy river" and "zero depth entry" & "slide" at West Side Park are extravaganzas that we could get along without. (plus the liability, maintenance, and, per MSA the need for 12-14 lifeguards)

I wish we could sit down with a pool designer and come up with sound figures for a basic "no glam" indoor pool. For sun worshippers have glass sliding doors to an outdoor patio with lawn chairs.

An indoor pool was not an option on the last referendum.

I believe there is room for an indoor, 8 lane, 25 meter pool at Creekside Place. I'm sure if we put an indoor pool at Creekside, the school would be renting it for swim team practice, swim meets, and aqua-jogging for the track, cross country, and other athletic teams for workouts. /or/ Would it be possible for the city and the school to get together on neutral ground and operate a pool at Creekside Place???

An outdoor pool would be used 75 days at most. Lifeguards aren't out of school until a few days into June and they go back to school in August. Then subtract days for inclement weather. When we think of 90 days, the reductions for weather and staffing bring us down to 75 days usage.

In my research I have been told that maintenance on an outdoor pool is more expensive than an indoor pool due to our extreme weather changes (expansion and contraction) (issues with mechanicals and concrete).

Let's re-visit the pool concept. Let's build a <u>year around</u> pool in Evansville that will work for everyone. (water walkers, aqua athletics for seniors, lap swimmers, swim team, aqua-jogging, infant introduction, & swim lessons for all ages.)

Given the numbers provided to me, if we subtract the lazy river, 0 depth entry, bathhouse, and outdoor pool from the \$11 million budget, that would leave us with \$8,950,000 for an indoor pool. Let's get numbers from a couple of pool companies and determine if can do this.

I've handed out a document with 22 items listed. These are notes taken when meeting with Aquatic Directors.

I also have an architectural blue print of the Oregon Pool and a drawing that I made of the Oregon Pool showing the six lap lanes and diving well.


- 8 lanes 25 meters long 64 lengths = one mile
 25 yards long 72 lengths = one mile
 With an 8 lane pool, several activities can take place at once in the pool (lessons in some lanes, lappers in some lanes, water walkers in some lanes, swim team in some lanes.
- 2. Have diving well separate from lap lanes. Track and cross country teams use it (aqua jog) If the diving well is at the end of the lap lanes, it restricts usage of the lap lanes.
- 3. Have diving board if it will be used as a community/school pool
- 4. Have a room for guards and teachers with shower & toilet.
- 5. Hot tub is good if it is properly maintained and not like a hotel hot tub. People with joint replacements, etc., use it. Oregon maintains their hot tub as meticulously as the pool.
- 6. Equipment room and storage room
- Deck space have elevated space (bleachers) for spectators for swim meets, etc. Having spectators on the deck can make the deck too congested and a fire hazard.
- 8. Stoughton has an 8 lane indoor pool NO outdoor pool Oregon has a 6 lane indoor pool NO outdoor pool. NO splash pad.
- 9. Swim meets bring in revenue as well as rentals such as Special Olympics, birthday party rentals, etc.
- 10. Have a Director's office with computer and a place for confidential conversations with staff
- Classroom space (multi-purpose room) next to the pool for lifeguard class, CPR training, water safety instructor class, and birthday party rentals. Place to store books and training materials.
- 12. Have male and female locker rooms and also have family locker room for parents with small children. Have changing tables for youngsters as well as people with special needs.
- 13. Have individual showers rather than one big open shower area.

- 14. Floor in locker room use the new products, NOT carpeting. Stay away from tile around the pool and showers because it is slippery and costly to maintain grout and broken tile, year after year. Check out the new flooring available for pools and locker rooms.
- 15. Have a swim suit dryer in each locker room this is a spinner.
- 16. Use plastic non-graffiti type lockers and restroom stalls.
- 17. Have automatic toilets, sinks and dryers sensor will turn off this saves electricity and water.
- 18. Check with Alliant Energy they will pay for cost savings items.
- 19. Don't use salt feeders or liquid chlorine liquid chlorine is stronger than bleach and is dangerous. NO liquid chlorine.
- 20. Oregon uses Pulsar tablets (chlorine tablets) which are very user friendly. The company they deal with Carrico Aquatic Resources, Inc (1-800-832-7147) out of lowa. They now have a branch in Stoughton, Wisconsin. They will check our source water and recommend treatment for our specific type of water. This company is a very helpful. If you have any problems, they make the service call the very same day.
- 21. Be sure to use good quality commercial filters not residential. A few years ago Verona had a re-do of their filtration system because of residential filters. Don't go for the cheapest thing because it will come back to haunt us at a higher cost to repair.
- 22. Have long counter with long mirror and plenty of electrical outlets for hairdryers and curling irons in the women's locker room. (approx. 4 6 outlets). Many people go directly to work from the pool.
